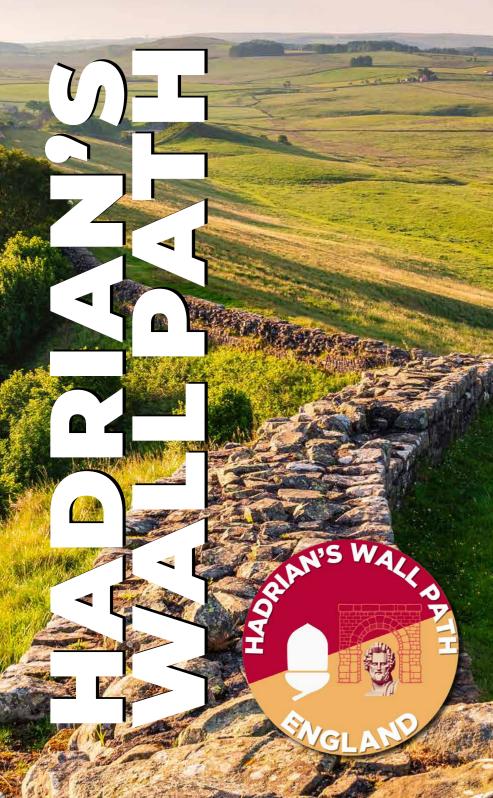

Venturing away from the big city lights and delving into the open country, the Hadrian's Wall rage Site,

The trail itself is relatively easy with the highest point of the path climbing to 345 m high. With its well-maintained paths and few elevated climbs, Hadrian's Wall Path is often considered to be one of the most enjoyable National Trails in the UK as well as one of the most popular.

The section between Chollerford, Lanercost and Newtown is the highest and 'wildest' part of the path. It is also where the Wall is most visible.

This area includes several important Roman forts including Chesters, Housesteads, Vindolanda,

the Roman Army Museum and Birdoswald. Following the flowing River Eden and then moving through the flat landscape along the Solway Firth, the route reaches its end in Bowness-on-Solway on the Irish Sea.

The trail progresses along footpaths, cycle lanes, well-maintained paths through fields and tracks along the top of the Northumberland Crags.

WEST TO EAST

Hadrian's Wall Path can also be hiked West to East. The prevailing wind in the UK is from the west, so walking eastwards means you have the wind at your back most of the time.

Some of the best views along the centre section are from West to East, finishing in Newcastle can make travelling onwards much easier. There is also something poetic about finishing at a place called 'Wallsend'.

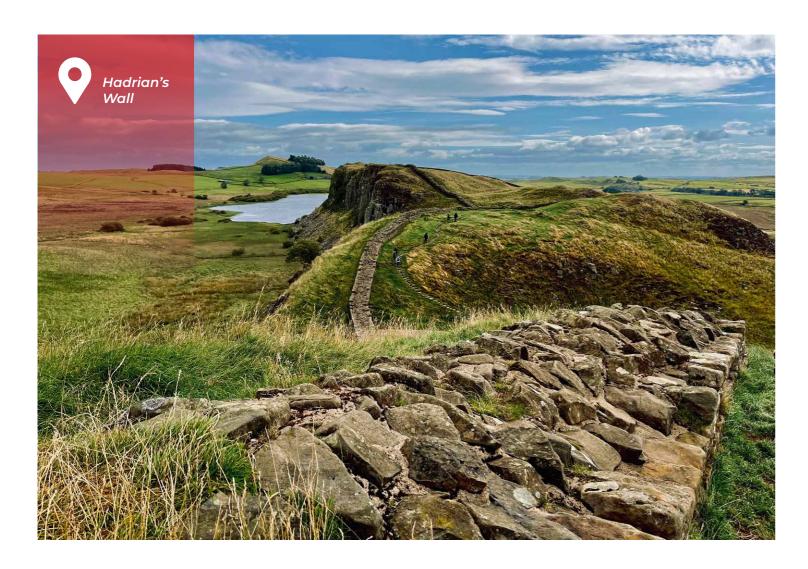
A long-distance trail that runs from East to West and through a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the Hadrian's Wall Path takes you on a spectacular journey across the northern edge of Roman Rule in ancient Britain.

The 135km (84 mile) trail keeps close to the remains of Hadrian's Wall — a defensive wall built by the Romans in 122AD — ensuring you are within reach of yesteryear

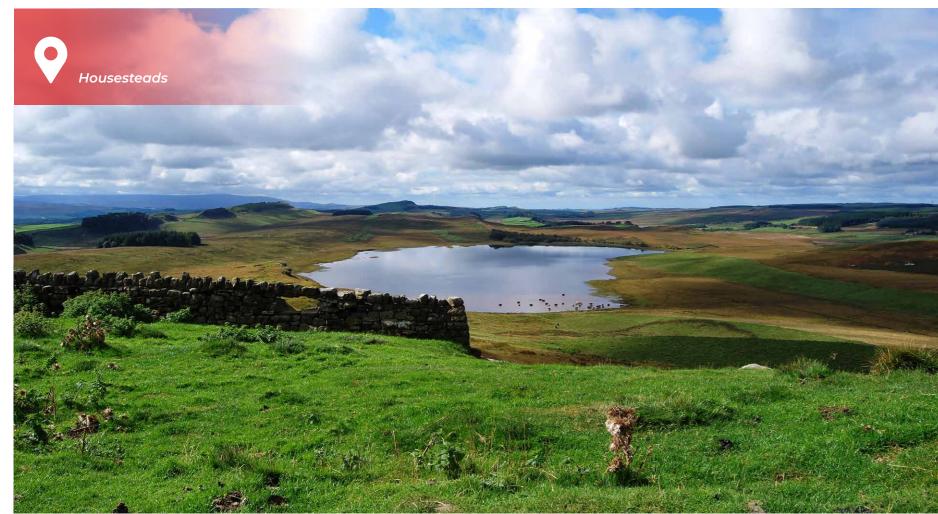
history of a defensive outpost with the rugged beauty of English moorland and rolling fields. You will even get to see Carlisle and Newcastle Upon Tyne. Known for its friendly hikers you'll be enthraled by its varied landscapes from the windswept heights of Highshields Crags to the peaceful, green pastures of the Eden Valley.

This trail combines the rich

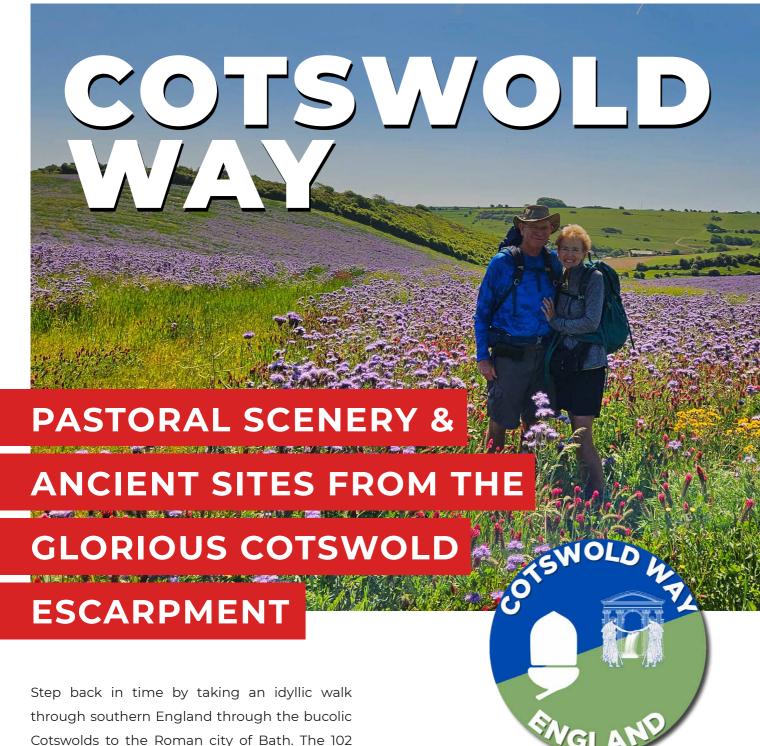
every step of the way.











mile (164km) Cotswold Way has been an official National Trail since 2007.

Following along the edges of the Cotswold Hills, the route journeys through rolling pastures, beech woodlands and honey-coloured villages built from Cotswold stone. To satisfy the historian in you, the route offers ancient commons in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, Neolithic burial barrows, stately homes and historic battle sites.



Extending from the quintessential English market town of Chipping Campden, the Cotswold Way follows quiet paths through lush farmland and charming English villages, such as Broadway and Stanton.

Witness beautiful views from Dover's Hill and explore the lush meadows and blooming woodland sections of the trail as it drops down

to the ruins of Hailes Abbey before continuing to the bustling former wool town of Winchcombe.

Pass the ancient long barrow of Belas Knap, to the highest point of the trail at Cleeve Hill. Wander through the ancient beechwoods and limestone grassland to reach some prehistoric sites as the route passes to the East and South of nearby Cheltenham and Gloucester.

Reward yourself with panoramic views, ancient burial chambers and Iron Age hill forts which accompany the trail through beech woods and green fields on its way to the enchanting village of Wotton-under-Edge. The route passes a number of picturesque locations which will provide the perfect backdrop for some memorable photos.

The last section of the hike traverses through the sprawling countryside estates of two wonderful old country homes at Dodington Park and Dyrham Park. After crossing a 17th century battlefield, the route descends to Bath, where the spectacular Bath Abbey and the Roman Baths are a fitting location to mark the end of the Cotswold Way.

The rolling terrain is ideal for gentle rambles while the many villages along the route are the perfect setting for long pub lunches. The total aggregate ascent is approximately 4,000m across the entire route.

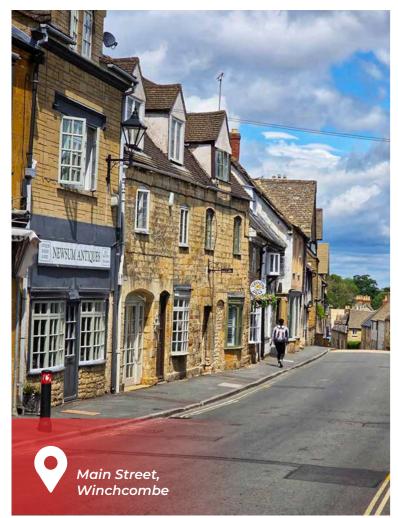

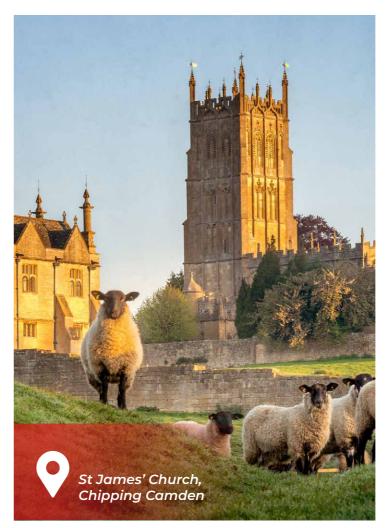

The South West Coast Path is a 1,014 km (630 miles) long-distance trail which stretches from Somerset to Dorset. Our walking tours focus on the 173km (107.5 miles) long central section of the trail in south west Cornwall between Padstow and Penzance. This part of the trail is also known as the 'Cornwall Coast Path' and offers some of the best coastal walking in Europe.

What sets The South West Coast Path far above many other UK national trails is that around almost every corner is yet another surprise. This path is not a modern creation. Instead, it brings you on an adventure where you retrace the footsteps of past times. Find all of this and more on a recreational trail that has twice been voted 'Britain's Best Walking route'.

THE ROUTE

With dramatic coastal scenery and breathtaking views of surrounding countryside and moorland, the South West Coast Path offers something for everyone. Whether you're an experienced hiker looking for a challenge, a relaxed rambler wanting scenic strolls, or a family keen to explore the great outdoors, the South West Coast Path should definitely be on your radar.

Delve into the dramatic headlands, steep coastal valleys, tiny fishing villages, bustling seaside resorts, wooded estuaries and golden beaches sprayed by an everpresent Atlantic surf. Whatever your favoured landscape is, you are sure to find it on this trail.

Keep an eagle eye out for roaming wildlife such as seabirds, dolphins, seals and even whales, adding even more excitement to your trip.

Walking the path is one of the best ways to experience an authentic Cornwall - a land of pirate myth and smuggling legend. Along the way, hikers are also reminded of the area's industrial past in the form of quarrying, mining, lime burning, fishing and boat building.

Trace the well maintained footpaths and pleasant beaches following a route that never strays far from villages and towns. The highest point of this section of the trail is 110m above sea level and the route



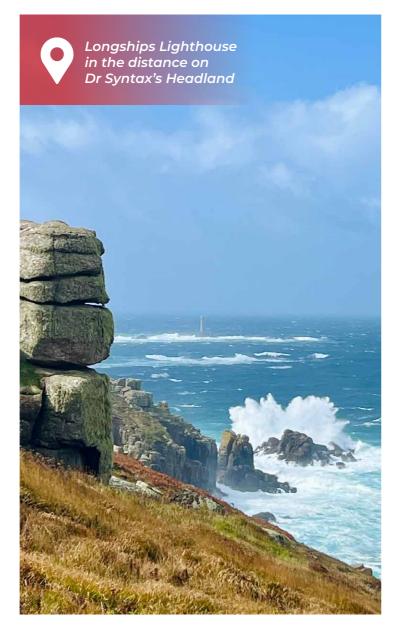
typically keeps below 100m. The total aggregate ascent adds up to approximately 5,300m over the route.

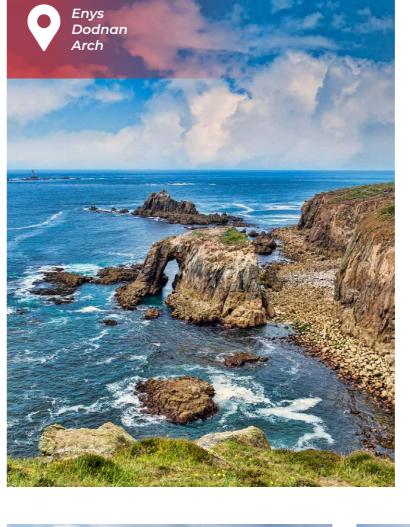
The beautiful and dramatic Atlantic coastline of west Cornwall follows the paths used by official Coastguards on the lookout for illegal imports of alcohol and tobacco. The trail is part of the longest and most spectacular National Trail along the most westerly tip of England.

If you fancy a bite to eat after all that walking, you can indulge and enjoy some fresh Cornish fish, famous Cornish pasties and a delicious Cornish ice-cream as you discover the world renowned cuisine in the quiet villages of one of the 'Celtic Nations'.

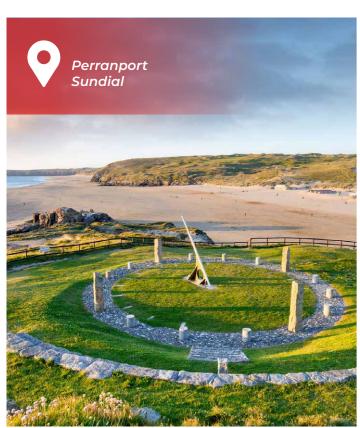








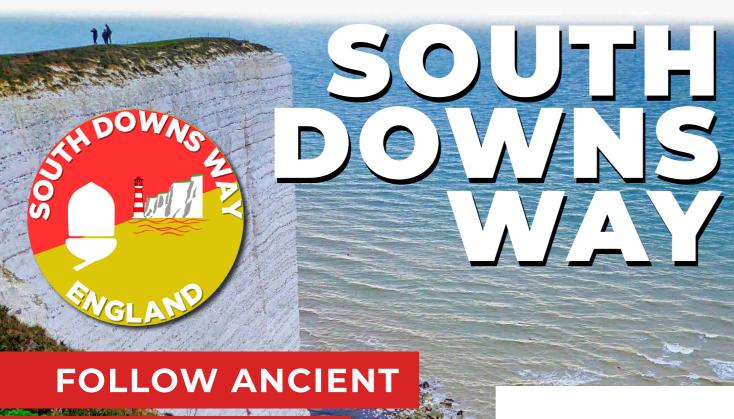

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Travel the length of the South Downs Way and behold interesting wildlife, prehistoric relics, wonderful pubs and pretty villages.

The South Downs Way route follows the old trails and droveways along the chalk escarpment and ridges of the South Downs.

The trail offers visitors a haven that seems a million miles away from the hustle and bustle of modern life, yet remains only minutes from civilisation.

The meandering route provides a wonderful trip for long distance walkers looking for an exciting short break.

The trail gives a hint of the surrounding landscapes ahead with spectacular views, wildflower meadows old woodlands and charming villages. The area is steeped in history, extending from the Stone-age and Iron-age to the Norman age and beyond.

The route starts in the historic city of Winchester and finishes at the iconic Victorian seaside town of Eastbourne next to the stunning white cliffs of Beachy Head.

THE ROUTE

Dust off those walking boots and set foot on the beautiful South Downs Way. Whether you are an experienced walker wanting to complete the trail in a short space of time or prefer a more gentle wander through the rolling hills, this is the ideal route for you. The trail is considered to be one of the most scenic coastal paths in the UK with a mixture of colourful forestry and moorland to magnificant coastal edges.

Along the trail you can also visit some of the best preserved Roman mosaics in Britain at Bignor.

Almost the entire walk follows good tracks and open grassland, suitable for hikers of all abilities. A varied landscape awaits, filled with protected habitats, internationally important chalk cliffs, chalk streams, rare species, rich grasslands and beautiful ancient woodland. The route traverses through the South Downs National Park where you can enjoy stunning wildlife at close proximity.

The elevated position for most of the trail ensures you are regularly rewarded by breathtaking views across the English Channel and the Isle of Wight. The aggregate ascent over the entire route is approximately 4,200m.
